


## Palette pointers

Backsplash tile establishes turquoise (1) as the kitchen's backdrop. The island pulls in the color to complete its dominant role. Cabinets in can't-go-wrong white (4) provide long-lasting appeal and balance the boldness. Movable accents, such as dinnerware, in citrus hues of yellow (2) and orange (3) add zest to the cool scheme. Their equal intensity is key to the palette's strength.



n all-white kitchen was the original plan when Ashley Menger and Adam Talianchich built their house. "We were thinking of resale," says Ashley, who with her husband owns an Austin design-build firm.
